

Butternut Orzotto

Ingredients

1kg butternut squash

4 × 15ml olive oil

1 tsp. ground mace

1 onion

500g pearl barley

125ml white wine

1.2 liters veg stock

250g mascarpone

75g pine nuts

1 tsp. fresh sage

Salt and pepper

Method

Preheat the oven to 220C. Slice the butternut, remove the seeds and cut into approx. 1-inch cubes. Tip the butternut cubes out onto roasting tray with 2 tablespoons of the oil and half a teaspoon of the ground mace, and shake the butternut around to coat them in the oil. Roast for about 40-50 minutes. or until tender. Meanwhile, gently cook the chopped onion for about 10 minutes in the remaining oil. Turn up the heat to medium, add the barley to the onion, and stir for about 2 minutes. turning the barley in the

mixture, then turn the heat up to high, add the wine and let it bubble down a bit. Add the hot vegetable broth, put a lid on the pan and let the orzotto cook gently for about 30 minutes, or until done but still nubby.

When the squash is tender, take it out of the oven and put half of it (judging by eye only) in a blender with half the mascarpone, and liquidize. Stir this into the cooked barley and season to taste.

Add the remaining mascarpone plus, if needed, some vegetable stock along with the remaining squash cubes and mace.

Stir gently for about 15

minutes.
While the orzotto is
cooking, toost the pine nuts
by tossing them in a hot,
dry frying pan until they
turn a deep gold.
Stir half the pine nuts into

Sfir half the pine nuts into the orzotto and scatter the remaining half, along with the chopped sage, on top.


Garnish with a few sage leaves.

From our Log Books

At the start of 1916 the attendance was poor, but not because of the weather for a change. Mr Johnston said, "the shooting tenant at Claonaig is employing the scholars to help at the shooting". Mr Johnston was very pleased with good progress during the second week of January, but this did not last into the next week.

The roll was marked by Mr Hector Currie and found to be correct. Mr Johnston was pleased that the grammar lessons (speech or writing that obeys rules) "bore fruit". On the 8th of February an HMI visited the school. Bad weather and an epidemic of colds meant that the attendance was poor and Mr Johnston was exasperated because he could not get on with the work especially in the younger classes. Those children had to walk a long distance to school. In March the Reverend William Eadie the minister of the church in Skipness checked the roll. In April there was a short Easter break which started on Thursday 20th and lasted until Wednesday the 26th. There was a geography "revisal" test of Africa for the seniors and England in the junior class which gave good results. In June there was the "required at home nuisance", and this was keeping girls in the house to help. On the day the school closed for the summer vacation the children had a bible exam, when they had to learn long passages from the bible which were written in very difficult words. Nowadays children bring in games to play on the last day of the summer term.

In the new term, the boys were employed at harvest in September and in October there were 2 weeks of holiday for potato lifting. The weather was so bad that the crop could not be lifted. The boys were then absent from school and Mr Johnston was annoyed. He said, "The Board refuses to take measures to compel attendance." School Boards were made up of local people elected to run schools from 1872. School Boards with elected parent members started in 1988, but in 2006 Parent Councils with all parents included were introduced.
